For one week, we live and love with 250 amazing and beautiful women of God who are walking down the same path and striving for the same thing. Camp is

a place where a hug and an affirmation are never too far away. It is a place where prayer, both personal and communal, is built right into the daily schedule. Pine Hills is a place with more love and beauty than any other place in the world and the end of the week always comes way too soon.

But we can't stay in an easy place forever; things have to get a little uncomfortable in order for us to grow. And after 30 years of Pine Hills, many, many women have grown because of this camp. They have grown by going out into the real world and living out the mission they've been given, and by embracing ourselves for who we are, exactly who God made us to be. I can say that for myself too, because after this year I've come away from camp believing with my whole heart that I am beautiful just as I am, because God made me and loved me into being, and that is enough.

Just run...

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us.

Hebrews 12:1

I don't really enjoy running. I used to run a lot in connection with playing some game, but running for its own sake has never appealed to me. Now that I have given up basketball, however, I am reduced to running for strictly medicinal purposes. In fact, I probably wouldn't do that if it wasn't for my two dogs looking at me with their big, sad spaniel eyes in the morning begging me to take them out.

However, the topic of running came up recently when I was talking with a brother who is a former Marine, or I guess I should say and inactive Marine because once a Marine always a Marine, as I understand it. He is helping a young man get ready to head off to boot camp and as part of the regime, they go running.

It turns out that when the Marines go for a run, no one tells them how far they are going or how long they will be running. They just run. There is no counting down the mileage or checking your watch. You just run.

As I understand it, there are at least two things behind this approach. The first is to instill trust in your leader. He is the only one who knows the plan and he is taking into account what you need and what you are capable of. You might



need more than you want and find that you are capable of more than you expect under his leadership. Secondly, Marines are training for combat, not the 1500 meters or even a marathon. In combat there is no tape marking the end or clock saying the time is up. You have to keep going until the combat is over. You just run.



This got me to thinking. I believe this is what Paul is talking about when he says 'let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us'. Jesus knows the race he has marked out for us, we don't. Our place is to 'fix our eyes on Jesus'. He not only knows the race, but he has run it for us. We draw our strength from him, and from the 'cloud of witnesses', brothers and sisters in Jesus who are also running with us.

My tendency is to look for the finish line, or to start watching the clock. Like the Bridegroom in the Song of Songs, Jesus is saying to us, 'Come run with me'. Not to somewhere or for so long. We look to him and just run.

"Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need."

Hebrews 4:16

What is grace? How do we receive it? What difference does it make? How do I ask for more? Over the course of a week in mid-June, 125 campers and 60 staff sought answers to these questions at Pine Hills Boys Camp 2015. I'm happy to report that our earnest seeking of the Lord did not go unanswered!

Each day as we gathered for prayer in the mornings and especially during the longer prayer meetings on Tuesday and Thursday night, Jesus revealed His love for us and poured out His Spirit upon us. This year's theme focused on the important role of grace in our lives as young disciples. The boys dove in headfirst as they were led by Spirit-filled worship and preaching. Every year, the boys' number one highlight remains our prayer times because God shows up in a big way!

As we went through the week, my heart continued to burn with gratitude to the Lord for this camp and His constant presence with us. He truly smiles on us as we jump in the lake for Bear Clubs, workout at Milk and Cookies, refresh ourselves at meal times, battle each other during Conquest, and run all over camp with Capture the Flag. Rain or shine the boys clearly enjoyed all of the various activities.

I was also incredibly impressed with our staff this year. Before camp we decided we wanted to be defined by Joy, Service, and Humility and throughout the week I saw each of those virtues on full display. So much of camp's success depends on these older guys' tireless sacrifice for the boys.

Looking at the devastation in Detroit can be very discouraging. The population is about 2/3's of the maximum of over a million and there are thousands of abandoned homes and commercial buildings. But God still loves Detroit and one of the many groups that he has inspired to work for its restoration is LifeRemodeled. This ministry brings together a coalition of hundreds of churches and many businesses to renovate the city one neighborhood at a time.

Volunteers cleaned up trash, mowed lawns and cut back bushes at abandoned homes to beautify the 4 square miles around Osborn and make safe passageways for kids going to school.



For three years now they have targeted a high school and the several square miles around it for their attention. This year is was Osborn High's turn.

During the course of the week 12,000 volunteer-days resulted in 21 remodeled homes, 472 abandoned homes being boarded up, 302 blocks being beautified, and a new roof, cafeteria, library and gym for the high school!

This was the first year we've had any involvement, but we sent a small and enthusiastic team of Todd Hillaker, Sean & Jimmy Varblow and Phil Tiews to join with folks from all over Southeast Michigan, including many from right in the neighborhood where we were working. The team worked hard but had a great time. Next year we

will hopefully bring a larger crew.
